It has been my pleasure to start to build the potential of Anthem over the last two years, and what has become very clear is how crucial the work we are doing is for young people in Wales.

Anthem's role as a funder has begun with the launch of our Atsain fund. We ran two rounds of the fund in 2022 and also brought our grantees and the wider sector together to share learning around key sector issues. Working with Youth Music on this fund has really helped to shape Anthem, and I would like to thank the team at Youth Music for their generous support and guidance.

The other important piece of work for Anthem has been the establishment of our Youth Forum. It's vitally important for Anthem to have youth voice at the heart of our organisation, and I am always in awe of the amount of passion and talent that our Youth Forum members bring to Anthem.

Our position as an independent charity and funder is key to how we can be useful both to the youth music and music education sector, and to Welsh Government. We can build strong relationships with trusts and foundations, with local, national and international business, and with donors who want to support young people and music in Wales.

## Our Strategic Goals

Enabling Access: Reaching young people who have inequality of access through social deprivation, rural isolation or other challenging circumstances, strengthening infrastructure for music provision and plugging obvious gaps.

Outcome: Stronger sustainable pathways to music in place for young people in Wales.

Generating Opportunities: Expanding the range of opportunities on offer for young people, through school and the community.

Outcome: More partnerships between schools, music industry and youth music.

-Nurturing Talent: Delivering grants and bursaries to unlock talent and ensure progression for young people with musical or music-related talent, directly for individuals and through organisations.

Outcome: Young people drive Anthem in Wales.

#### Atsain Fund

Anthem launched the Atsain Fund in 2022. Atsain is our keynote strategic fund created to focus on breaking down barriers to music for young people in Wales and to open a youth music sector conversation about good practice in different contexts.



The total amount of funding awarded was £226,747, with most awards being between £7000 and £9000

Across the two rounds we had 59 applications and were able to fund 27 of them





The projects will work with 104 partner organisations during project delivery

The projects will reach a total of 2217 beneficiaries across Wales





Projects last for between 6 & 24 months

We launched the Atsain network in June following the initial funding round. The network meetings take place on a bi-monthly basis (June, September, November and February 2023). We have nearly 30 members, about half of which are Atsain-funded and half from the wider arts and youth sector. The events have



received very positive feedback, attendees have welcomed the opportunity to engage with new organisations, share best practice and access peer advice and support.

# Spotlight on Atsain Projects

WILDERNESS TRUST - MUSIC CIRCLE AT THE HANGING GARDENS

What: Bilingual workshops and concerts for babies & toddlers, instrumental lessons for young children aged four to seven, and music sessions for young people with learning disabilities.

Where: Llanidloes, Powys

Participant Numbers: 125

Partners: 6

**Key Outcomes:** New area of work for the organisation.

Sessions for babies and toddlers were very well attended and exceeded expectations. To accommodate demand, it was decided to continue running weekly sessions with a core group of parents, children and childminders attending.

As a result of parents getting to know each other they have organised a choir to sing Christmas carols, and now meet up regularly on Sundays.

"A large majority of the participants did not previously attend the Hanging Gardens and through this project have started to participate in other activities – young parents' group, sewing group, craft workshops, talks, events, or even just coming to the venue for a coffee or to spend some quality time with family and friends. I think this project has definitely reached out to many more groups in our community to get them interested in other things we do at the Hanging Gardens – resilience, healthy food, climate change, waste management".

#### **CANOLFAN GERDD WILLIAM MATHIAS**

What: Delivering music workshops and 'creation days' in partnership with youth clubs, local statutory services and disability charities in Gwynedd and Denbighshire in the 2022-23 academic year.

Where: North Wales

#### Participant Numbers: 75

#### Partners: 4

**Key Outcomes:** Increase and develop the provision of out-of-school music activity for disabled children and young people, so that they can develop their skills and realise their potential through music.

"Our aim is to ensure that disabled children and young people have the same opportunities as non-disabled children and young people to participate in music outside school and we hope that through this scheme we will, in consultation with the participants and their families, be able to develop more opportunities for disabled children and young people and also identify and remove barriers they currently face."

## BEACONS - RESONANT & TRANSFORM MUSIC

What: Resonant – a new music industry outlet for individuals of marginalised genders in South Wales, focusing on behind-the-scenes roles of the industry.

**TransForm Music** – research findings on the lived experiences of trangender and non-binary people working in the music industry or attending live music in England and Wales.

Where: Cardiff & Wider Wales

Participant Numbers: 129

#### Partners: 2

Key Outcomes: The creation of an intentional space providing valuable advice to people from marginalised genders just starting out in their career. Key research and guidance around how to create safer and more inclusive spaces for people who are transgender and/or non-binary that attend, work in or perform at their venue.

"As a young person growing up, I never came across other female or queer songwriters & producers and based on the current statistics on gender representation within the global

music industry, it is evident that there is still a great need for more people within this community to come through and take their seats at the table. Projects like Resonant change peoples lives and I'm very proud to be part of a team that are taking action to make this change," Millie Blooms, Mentor, Workshop and Shadowing Facilitator.


